INTERFAITH RALLY: STANDING TOGETHER FOR COMPASSION AND HUMANITY



The buzz and energy were palpable as over 200 people crowded into First Congregational United Church of Christ in Poughkeepsie on Sunday, July 8 to create posters reflecting their faiths caring for the stranger with dignity and compassion, and reflecting the moral obligations of all people of faith and good conscience, as well as their loud protests against current border policies that disregard the sanctity of family.

Over 100 more joined as the Dutchess County Interfaith Council Rally continued outside the church with songs of protest and solidarity to loud honks of support from passersby.

The group proceeded to the steps of the U.S. Post Office where The Reverend Walter LeFlore, president of the Board of Directors of DCIC, introduced speakers representing many faith communities, a DACA recipient

with her young children whose husband is currently being detained, and a leader of the Mid-Hudson Refugee Alliance.

The young mother with her three young children whose husband has been detained since April won the hearts of all present. Her husband is the support of a wonderful family whose children are American citizens. She is now holding two jobs while caring for her children just to survive.



Muriel Horowitz, chairperson of the organizing committee, reflected: "Her courage and her tears reminded us all why we were here. The first person to come to the Church gathering, she spoke for all who are unable to speak out - for those mothers and fathers separated from children and spouses, suffering indignities and disrespect."

Chanting by Sheela Srivastava, Beena Hotchandani and Kusum Gupta from the Hindu Samaj set the tone for the Post Office gathering.

Reverend Heather A. Moody, spiritual head of First Congregational United Church of Christ, composed the two new verses below to add to the song "This Land Is Your Land."

"At the port of entry, there was no welcome from the border officials or the ICE agents But beyond the wall I hear voices chanting This land was made for you and me.

You bring your children in search of safety, willing to work for a better future Your dream is my dream, and I'll stand up for you, 'Cause this land was made for you and me."



Our Christian faith compels us to struggle with the words of Holy Scripture as we confront what is happening in our world, today, to the 'least of these' – and specifically, on our own borders. Ed served on the Board of the DCIC before accepting the role of Executive Director. He was active on many DCIC committees including the Interfaith Music Festival, CROP Hunger Walk, Fair Trade and Homemade Bazaar, Story Circles, Thanksgiving Service, and the Annual Peace Story Concert.

He was dedicated to the Cursillo Ministry, and to a prison ministry where he would be "locked up" for the weekend while providing spiritual support to inmates.

He volunteered regularly at the Lutheran Care Center where he spread joy by singing and playing the piano.

He was a blessed light among us. May he rest peacefully.

SUPPER AND STORIES

The Annual Potluck Supper and Interfaith Story Circle was held on Wednesday, June 6 at Mariapolis Luminosa Focolare Movement Center in Hyde Park.

We numbered around 40 for supper. 30 or so stayed for the stories - a perfectly-sized circle of tellers and listeners - Roman Catholic, Protestant Christian, Jewish and Hindu persons. We heard all sorts of stories - traditional folk tales, personal experience stories, short pieces shared on the Internet and contemporary "miracle stories."



Lorraine Hartin-Gelardi began with a traditional story about a farmer whose life experiences never failed to bring either praise or sorrow according to his neighbors. The farmer, however, took everything in stride, always declaring, "We will see how this turns out." His attitude proved out his wisdom throughout his life. Muriel Horowitz told a traditional story about a poor man who discovered that the treasure he had dreamed of was right there under the refrigerator in his own home.

A contemporary miracle story was about a remote tribal group in central Africa, which was suffering a deadly health crisis that struck the children of the tribe. Today, as a result of many concerned people from around the world, there is a modern hospital in that area and the rate of childhood deaths has been dramatically reduced.



There was an apocryphal story about Jesus' ability to find and appreciate the goodness in everyone - four-leggeds and two-leggeds. There was a story about the importance of human devotion from the perspective of a recent TV program about Eleanor Roosevelt's devotion to her husband, Franklin, and about the devotion story from the ancient Indian epic, the Ramayana, about Sita's devotion to Rama in the face of being kidnapped by the demon king, Ravana.
