A sermon preached by Rev. Luanne Panarotti, Pleasant Plains Presbyterian Church Gospel Reading: Matthew 15:21-28 Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, 'Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon.' But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, 'Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us.' He answered, 'I was sent only to

the lost sheep of the house of Israel.' But she came and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, help me.' He answered, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' She said, 'Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you.

... And it all starts with the listening. We're having a listening problem in our nation right now. Amid all the unrest, we've all jumped into our ideological foxholes, and are busy lobbing hurtful, hateful, threatening things at each other across the social media divide. I was supposed to be working on a writing project of mine last week; instead I spent my time writing and deleting, writing and deleting Facebook responses, mostly because I didn't I think it was going to do any good anyway. We're all just sitting in our rooms, looking out on one direction, listening to the

echo of our own voices. And to some degree, that's how it is, right? We have our own lives, own experience, own perspective. But the only hope we have becoming a just society, a just community, a just nation is if we take some time to understand each other's perspectives. To listen to each other stories, most importantly the stories of hurt. The stories that need healing

UPDATE DRIVE-THRU FOOD DRIVE held on May 31:

In just two weeks, generous individuals like you and local faith-based groups raised over \$29,000 and donated hundreds of food boxes and grocery store gift cards. All monies raised were used to buy groceries and to make donations to food pantries, including a \$5,000 donation to Dutchess Outreach. (Dutchess Outreach has not only been preparing thousands of meals, but they are also making hundreds of deliveries to those who are unable to leave home.)
