Hunger is one of the greatest injustices facing our world. Ending Hunger One Step at a Time is the official motto of the CROP Hunger Walks, community wide walk events organized by religious groups, schools and others across the nation to support Church World Service, a faith based organization that helps communities across the globe deal with hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster. Twenty-five percent of the funds raised are returned to the local communities that host walks.

Since 1975, DCIC has participated in the CROP Hunger Walk, walking six miles throughout the city of Poughkeepsie. This year, the CROP Walk will be held virtually. Teams and individuals who walk can get creative about how to raise money. People can walk miles around their block or find a local trail. Virtual walks can be a car parade or donation drives that don't include walking. Even though the walks may be virtual, the need is REAL.

Susan Karnes Hecht is the President of Vassar Temple, which was founded in 1848 and is the oldest Reform congregation in the Hudson Valley as well as a charter member of the DCIC. Susan is proud of Vassar Temple's active participation in the interfaith community, particularly cooperative efforts on refugee resettlement and supporting Lunch Box at Dutchess Outreach. She believes that interfaith relationships are crucial in addressing the significant problems that we face and that local efforts are where this starts.

Susan is especially focused on environmental work. She believes that faith leaders, as trusted messengers, must serve as role models to push forward on climate justice. She serves as Climate Smart Task Force Chair for the Town of Poughkeepsie, where she is also a member of the Conservation Advisory Commission. She is a founding member of Citizens' Climate Lobby's chapter in NY's 18th Congressional District and works with this non-partisan organization on federal carbon pricing legislation. She is the driving force behind the establishment of the DCIC-Nexamp Community Solar partnership.

Susan recently retired as Clinical Coordinator at the Mid-Hudson Regional Early Education Center. She and her husband, David, are parents of a music teacher and a chemist. In her spare time, Susan studies cello and is an avid gardener currently engaged in turning her home property into a pollinator haven.

I'm AJ Stack, the new-ish priest at St. Thomas Episcopal in

Amenia. I arrived just before the pandemic...

I'm writing to see if perhaps the network of faith communities through DCIC might be able to help out a ministry here in our part of the county.

The Food of Life/Comida de Vida food pantry at St. Thomas has grown exponentially since March and we're making twice monthly trips to Highland with a 15-ft U-Haul truck to pick up about 5,000 pounds of food. Since the pick-up site is an hour's drive from us, it's becoming difficult to find the volunteers we need to help load the food onto the truck in Highland. With enough volunteers (3-6, usually), we can typically load everything in 10-15 minutes.

****Might you be able to connect me with some nearby faith communities who may have members who'd be willing to volunteer twice a month to help load?****

Highland is in Ulster County, but the park-andride where we pick up our food is VERY easy to access from Poughkeepsie.

The CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER-DAY SAINTS commemorates the 200th Anniversary of the First Vision of the Prophet Joseph Smith

Starting last week and continuing for the next six weeks, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will be making individual donations to 200 non-profit food pantries that provide food to those in need across New York — one for each year since the First Vision took place in upper-state New York in the spring of 1820. Over 1,620,000 pounds of food filling 36 tractor trailers will be delivered to the 200 food pantries across the state. Local recipients include Saint Andrews and St. Luke's Food Pantry in Beacon, Fishkill Food Pantry, Pawling Resource Center, Beulah Baptist Church Soup Kitchen and St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Poughkeepsie.

The motivation for this initiative is to commemorate one of the seminal events of the Restoration by giving back in a small way to those in New York. We are grateful for the climate of religious freedom in New York that allowed the Church to be established. It is hoped that these donations will raise awareness of the good that local food pantries do throughout the state and highlight the great need that these pantries have for continued donations. In addition, it is also hoped that this initiative will highlight the meaningful impact for good that people of all different faiths and backgrounds can have when they work together.
